Two historic shipwreck events were recorded on the Great Lakes during the past summer. One was on Lake Superior off Crisp Point and the other was closer home on Lake Huron off Grindstone City on the tip of the thumb. These two unrelated events took place years apart and resulted from entirely different causes. The only tie between them was that they were recorded by members of the same team of underwater explorers and photographers. The members of Lake Huron Lore are going to be able to see and hear about these two events the same evening, March 29th. Larry Coplin, Lake Huron Lore member, discovered the forward section of the DANIEL J. MORRELL about seven and one-half miles from the stern section last summer. There was a lapse of several years between the time of discovery of the forward and the after sections of this ship. The nameboard from the pilothouse which graces the fireplace of our Marine Room, through the generousity of Larry and his diving team, is one of the prized shipwreck artifacts of the Museum of Arts and History. Larry's picture story of the MORRELL shows the nameboard intact on the top of the pilothouse as the ship landed on the bottom right side up and was not destroyed.

The double reature program will also include scenes from the raising of the engine, boiler, propellor, steering quadrant and hardware intact from the hull of the Propellor INDIANA in the deep clear waters of Lake Superior, This was accomplished last summer through the efforts of a great many people and organizations. It all started when Lake Huron Lore member John Steele, Waukegan, Ill, found what turned out to be the oldest example of, a lake propellor driven vessel, complete with an unaltered engine, that has been found to date. The INDIANA, 147' in length, was built at Vermilion, Ohio, in 1848. She sank in 1858 after breaking a propellor blade. Her crew made it ashore near Crisp Point without incident. One hundred and fourteen years later scuba divers Kent Bellrichard, John Steele, and Bill Cohrs located the wreck and filmed it in its original condition. Two Great Lakes historians, Lake Huron Lore member Pat Labadie, curator of the Canal Park Museum, Duluth, Minn., and Dr. Richard Wright of Bowling Green University, Ohio, were interested in the pictures and discussed the find with the Smithsonian Institution, Washington. Soon that organization solicited the assistance of the Corps of Engineers and the United States Navy and the mission was accomplished. The materials were removed on two trucks to Washington, D.C. for restoration. Latest word that has been received is that the artifacts in a restored condition may be put on exhibit late this summer or early this fall. In an interview with John Steele on March 1st, he said that he was going back on the INDIANA as soon as weather permits to secure some additional mechamical equipment for the Smithsonian. It would be nice to see an entire engine room of an early vessel restored.
