SOCIETY MEMBERS REMEMBER STORM DEAD

On November 9, 1994, four members of Lake Huron Lore Marine Society traveled to Goderich, Ontario for a quiet ceremony held at the Mainland Cemetery there. The occasion was the eighty-first anniversary of "The Big Storm of 1913" in which numerous vessels were lost on Lake Huron along with many lives. The bodies of a number of unidentified crew members washed ashore at Goderich and neighboring towns following the storm. Largely through the efforts of our late esteemed Goderich member, Ronald Pennington, a number of grave sites of lost seamen were discovered and given recognition.

HURON_LIGHTSHIP_NEWS

Captain Ted Richardson reports that the Huron Lightship concluded its 1994 season with record visitor attendance of just under 14,000...twice the number recorded the previous year. Ted and his crew report the refurbished steam heating system has worked marvelously well this winter. Upon re-opening to visitors in the spring, additional volunteers will be welcomed to host public tours. The vessel will be open Wednesdays through Sundays from 1:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. The Society's Annual Flea Market is scheduled at the Port Huron Museum on June 3rd.

Finally, we tip our hats to the Huron Lightship crew for their efforts this past holiday time at the outstanding display of Christmas lights that adorned the vessel. MARINE_NEWS

The St. Lawrence Seaway closed December 28th, the Soo Locks on January 15th. Both systems are scheduled to re-open March 25th. For the 1994 season, seaway cargoes of iron and steel were up 117%, grain up 17% and iron ore up 12%. Total seaway tonnage was 36.7 million metric tons, 19% higher than 1993.
